City Council scheduled two special sessions to consider the topic of economic development – March 1st and March 16th, 2021. Following the first session, an on-line community survey was circulated to gather public input on economic development activities, gather information about housing and employment, as well as to gauge community sentiment about the direction and future of Fort Bragg. Public feedback is crucial to better understand community priorities and opinions as Council develops programs and policies to implement economic development activities.

This survey will be discussed following Paul Garza's presentation the evening of March 16, 2021.

With the ghost-town-like feeling on Franklin Street, it would not be a place that I would also not walk alone or as a couple at night.

Code enforcement is non-existent. Street surfaces seem to break down very quickly.

This problem pertains to the entire coastal region rather than FB, but affects us all. Vacation rental homes all along the coast should be heavily taxed. We have plenty of BNB's and hotels to meet the needs of visitors.

I just want to enjoy life and give back to the community

I have a government job making a reasonable wage, and a partner who works in the private industry also making a reasonable wage. We have no kids, no debt, and are frugal. We STILL can't afford to buy a house because it is impossible for us to compete with Bay Area salaries and corporations bidding on investment/Covid-19 properties. God forbid our landlord decides to sell, or we'll be out on the street like so many other hard-working honest people who's landlords saw \$\$\$ during the pandemic, and now beyond. The supply of rentals is also impossible to compete in, even if I pay MORE than half of my paycheck. Currently refinancing to lower payment. When done it will only take it down to 37% of monthly income for housing. To be really stable, it should be under 30%. With the rental, you add costs so the current situation is probably right at 60%. One must cover themselves to cover risk of bad tenants. CA is NOT landlord friendly at all. Especially now with COVID allowing folks to basically live free. It does not allow landlords to not pay on their mortgages. Nothing is free in life. PLUS, the housing market will take a dive with all the forbearances, once lifted. It will cause a housing glut. Interest rates will skyrocket. Please keep Ft Bragg authentic. It's not a town for big box and chains. Let's support local efforts and encourage more sustainable, needed businesses (love that we have a butcher, for instance, fresh fish and farms). Avoid going headlong into cannabis tourism.

We need to attract something beyond the tourist industry - a conscientious research organization or affiliation with an industry outside of tourism, which could help create jobs for a sustainable future.

COVID-19 has not stopped tourism and CBD relies heavily on it!! There are no good public restrooms! the blue porter potty is not a good enough solution! The parking limit is a serious issue as of 2020. the 2 hour parking limit is not enough time for those coming to shop and eat lunch, why penalize them with a ticket for staying a bit longer?! However without a metermaid in 2020, 1/3 of the cars downtown are here all day. mostly people who work downtown. It is beyond frustrating!!

I truly think our lovely town of "Fort Bragg" would prosper hugely by changing the name from an outdated, embarrassing part of our past. The "fort" was established to round up our Native Americans. These Americans, who had called this area home for centuries were relocated, raped, and murdered. Why would we want to be reminded of this every time we say, read, or think Fort Bragg??? Also this was a "fort" for not more than 18 months back in 1860's, when it was then abandoned by the soldiers who all went back East to fight in the Civil War. So in 2021, some 160 years later, we still call this place "fort"... And Confederate General Bragg, who promoted slavery, a man very much disliked by his peers and subordinates at the time, never even set foot in California, let alone in our lovely coastal area. Let's move FORWARD. Let's move forward honoring our Native Americans who were here long before us. Let's use one of their names, Noyo, for instance. Noyo sounds better, feels better, and is the name of our river and our harbor which everyone is familiar, even tourists know the name. The entire energy of our town would change and become more prosperous. Out with the old and in with the new for the 21st century! Let's stop living in the past! We can Be so much more Together!

I really was very surprised at the lack of communication from the city to the individual stores as to what to do and expect in the case of having no power (1) and Covid shutdown/reopening strategies. (2) I am a phone call away and would love to be more informed as to emergency status. We are a small town and I would like to stress that keeping things a bit more personal might be very successful. Please focus on employment and housing

Please start using code enforcement to clean up out town. It is looking pretty junky these days. A fresh coat of paint goes a long way...

Adding more motels without increasing the water supply, puts an unfair burden on those that live here and produces mostly minimum wage jobs with no benefits and more trash on our headlands. Maybe new motels should have to pay livable wages and benefits (Costco can, and they compete with Walmart) also maybe they should be assigned maintaining a section of the coastal trail to maintain and keep clean.

Many live just outside of "City limits" and do not have a voice. We work in "City limits". We shop in "City limits". We play in "City limits" - yet are not allowed to VOTE. Please do something about this. It is time to be INCLUSIVE of ALL of our 95437 residents

Please acquire the remaining millsite land. Return it to the Pomo, restore airstrip, and build fairgrounds. Also, our playing field restoration should be fully funded. The tournaments bring in more TOT than visit fb spends. Put money where it actually brings in tourists.

Seeing the rundown empty buildings and transients taking over the benches and blocking the sidewalks make me sad for our future success, especially when I hear and see the reactions of visitors. The influx of new and returning young people with fresh ideas gives me hope, along with the current city council's stated desire to take steps to improve all aspects of the city for all of its residents. Water, water, water. We are already, in March, talking about upcoming drought conditions that will likely lead to water restrictions. We need to develop more water sources and storage before we develop more housing. Rural areas still without broadband are faltering and getting left behind. Kudos to the person who came up with the idea of the city investing in broadband. Partnering with mcn might just be the way to make it happen.

Please do not let this beautiful town turn into Berkeley, full of drugs and homeless.

FB can capitalize of being forward-thinking in terms of energy and water use. Given the water issues here, can Mendocino County or the city of Fort Bragg develop a program to encourage and help residents buy and install rain catcher systems? I think that such important yet simple systems should be loudly promoted and facilitated.

Regarding question 16, the city has a great deal of potential, but if it continues on the current trajectory I don't think things will improve much in the years to come. Leadership needs to provide vision and have the skills necessary to see things through.

The biggest issue seems to be lack of decent paying jobs. It's difficult to impossible to open any kind of well paying business to locate in CA under the tax structure. Until that changes Ft Bragg will continue to decline. Tourism doesn't provide living wage jobs and never will.

I assume, in the first section above, that #1 is top priority and #8 is the least?

Ft. Bragg consistently seems to damage itself by making poor decisions. It effectively destroyed it's best retail area, Franklin St., when it pointlessly "remodeled" it's most important block some years ago. That entire retail area has never really recovered. It also seems to lag in policing the homeless population, which is a SERIOUS issue for both tourists & residents. It has lost much of it's SKILLED labor workforce (which is essential to maintain the local infrastructure). It has a narrow gauge railway that actually used to transport goods & passengers from inland, (that could employ a healthy number of maintenance workers), that sits idle most of the time & is not even useful as a genuine "tourist" draw...even though it could easily feature in "Green Tourism". Another asset that is poorly supported & utilized! The town also has poor signage to help visitors locate the ER, it seems to lack any support for local arts,...(music...theater...dance?). It also seems uncaring about the natural beauty of the coastline (the principal draw for most visitors!!), and it has permitted the decline, (& near death), of the local junior college, (without which no quality kid is going to stay in the area!). Without proper healthcare AND a healthy, GENUINE college experience available.....why would anyone but the dregs

stay in Fort Bragg? Lets be honest for once. And what do the dregs produce? Not much, other than garbage & the consumption of products & services.

I am horrified at the flea market set up in the north parking lot of the coastal trail and I'd like more enforcement of the mask mandate.

We need more farming right in town in case of issues with the bridges across Noyo River and Pudding Creek. Any future parking lot creating or updating should use porous paving. We can improve our local climate by planting crops and building soil all over the place—including in long narrow planter boxes that divide the car lane of a street from the walk/stroller/trike lane of a street.

Create a place, away from the coastline but not too far inland where a retail area can attract at least one big box store, like Costco. The amount of gasoline wasted by driving to Ukiah by the coast residents will more than pay for itself. I'm not hopeful--socially, economically, or culturally--that Fort Bragg is the place to raise our young family. We live in a fancy house we can't afford to maintain, we scramble to make ends meet, and many of our neighbors are trash-throwing, drunk-driving, American-flag-waving surly-faced folk who we don't want to know further. About Question #16: information about what FBG (Fort Bragg Government) is doing to improve the CBD is published in the local newspapers, but now that the newspapers are owned by a larger consortium outside of Fort Bragg quite a few folks that we know have stopped their subscriptions. A Fort Bragg newsletter either drop mailed or available locally at businesses, the Post Office, or locations of the City's choosing would be an asset. The websites offer some information but mining through any city, county (!), or State website can be cumbersome and exhausting. And to emphasize our commitment to the City of Fort Bragg, as semi-retirees, we spend approximately \$10,000 per year on food/retail/essentials. If the variety of offerings in the CBD and elsewhere improved, the funds we spend in Ukiah would lessen and we'd be spending more in the City of Fort Bragg, a local life-line for us but not without its limitations. And, as far as housing is concerned, put forth additional limitations on AirBNB, VRBO, and the like. In 2015 I did my own survey of those offerings which took hours to accomplish; I discovered over 400 AirBNB and VRBO between Point Boonville and Westport which did not include the various Inns, Hotels, and Motels that advertise on their websites. These have not only hurt local IHM business, but have contributed to lack of available housing for say, medical professionals, and others wanting to bring business to the City of Fort Bragg. Thank you for including us in the survey,

The housing crisis on the coast must be solved!

Women need more support.

I think mountain biking could be a big tourism draw.

Please consider the talent that is needed for economic development. It is very hard to find a dependable workforce here. There are definitely hard workers here on the coast and their bosses know it! I don't know how new businesses will be able to operate if they don't have a reliable staff. Staff can't continue to live in FB because of the lack of housing. I've seen teachers not be able to find a house because they have a cat, or worse, a dog.

I have conceived and presented an array of economic development opportunities for which there is a great need, but no apparent interest on the part of the city Counsel. I have concluded that there is not sufficient desire on the part of Counsel members to justify further investments of time and energy.

Our town is drowning. I appreciate the City trying to help. A big problem is housing and good paying jobs. Working part time jobs is something somewhat new for me (last year and a half), I was previously at my full time job for 10 years but left do to childcare issues. I know it's a free market, but the listing I see for rentals is crazy.... I really think trying to build an aquarium on the GP land would be beneficial. It would create long term and permanent jobs as well as stimulate our economy by being a huge tourist attraction. Thank you for creating this survey!

Houseless situation neeeeeddddddssss attention. People don't deserve to suffer like this.

I would like to see FB police and/or community watch bicycle patrols. I wish that those of us outside city limits who work and shop in FB could vote on issues and representatives that matter to us.

I am concerned of reports I hear of lifting the cap on dispensaries. I fear that if dispensaries are allowed to dominate, 1) other businesses will be priced out, 2) the downtown will become less inviting for most who would otherwise visit, and 3) in the not-so-long run, the dispensaries will fail, leaving us with a further gutted downtown.

Beware the curse of overtourism. It is real. Just look at Tahoe, where the city councils favor tourist dollars over the needs of its residents. Some tourism is good, but it can't be the main revenue stream, as it corrodes the quality of life for residents here and makes the local economy subject to the boom and bust of tourism. We need good schools, a thriving college, broadband...look at Arcata for inspiration.

We need creative progressive. Leadership to bring FB forward. Instead of clinging to a tattered industrial past that never will be again, rebrand fort Bragg ——change the name; invest in broadband and housing; instead of trying to find ways to keep what used to be look for ways FB can be part of a new economy. Leverage the presence of the hospital along with our beautiful environment into a health care/recovery industry.

Don't lump all formula business as the same. Dollar chains are not right for any community.

The downtown needs the corner of Franklin and Redwood as an open space plaza. There should be a tree planting program. More energy needs to be put into planting trees and taking care of them, than cutting them up and burning them!

Be a visionary and leader for a sustainable city in respect for the amazing environment in which we live.

City leadership must start having conversations regarding Fort Bragg and future generations and stop spending so much time on minutia that does not improve living conditions or put Fort Bragg in a position to have a bright future. Stop letting a small group of the public determine the business of the city and take up precious staff and leadership time to focus on the future including incentivizing businesses, attracting new industries and doing something with the Mill Site. There needs to be more updated and maintained and on trend info online about Fort Bragg. Not some craptastic restaurant site that doesnt work on mobile, and has menus that are over a year old. Not tote bags. Not stickers. TECHNOLOGY, where people can see what is going on in FB without having to stare at a damn plastic bulletin board in person. Helping people navigate all the licenses, fees, and permits, rather then making more walking maps.

If you want to maximize business in Fort Bragg, focus on ecotourism. This means supporting things like the Mendocino Coast Redwood Preserve, keeping large amounts of green space on the mill site. There are large undeveloped lots within the City of Fort Bragg which could be developed for affordable housing. The City should pass a land tax to make in unprofitable for people to hold undeveloped land within the city.

I hope the council, which is currently quite conservative/Republican won't go for low wage chain store jobs. Work with cannabis more, work with woodworking school, tribal amenities, but dont trash the town up with chains.

We need to get a handle on the transients that wonder the street and create an unsafe feeling and limit the number of cannabis retail establishments.

More mixed housing would help.

Add a metric for how much of any business's revenue stays in the community. Use it as part of the economic impact statement for any proposed business occupancy permit.

We need to build housing, not just low income but all incomes. We can't hire outside professionals mostly due to " can't find decent housing" so expensive to build, what incentive can the city offer?

I don't sense that the city recognizes the influence of the retired senior community and how they can support the operation of the city

I think Fort Bragg has always been a small town because it can only support a limited number of people due to the limited economic opportunities and our remote location.

We need to support living wage jobs and industry.
