




Introduction

Their entire town has weekly tsunami evacuation drills that every single person at the schools partake in, from 1st graders, all the way to staff and 12th graders.

One of the greatest things we learned in Otsuchi was about the tradition of their festival in which we all got the chance to participate in it. More on that in another slide.

Learning about the Disaster

- Learned about the Great East Japan Earthquake of 2011
- A very sensitive topic as many people were lost
- Over half of the city was destroyed to the earthquake, tsunami, and subsequent fires
- Took them 5 years to elevate the land alone and many more to restore infrastructure
- We greatly helped them in the recovery process and it strengthened our bond as Sister Cities

- Regardless of language barrier we built unforgettable bonds that will be remembered forever and we all learned from one another.








Personal Change and Growth

The Otsuchi Festival:




- Festival's Significance:Shichi-Fukujin
