BUDGET PROCESS

The City of Fort Bragg's budget is a fiscal plan with projected revenues and estimated costs to provide essential services to the public, including police services, fire prevention services, and maintenance of the City's streets, parks, and infrastructure.

BUDGET HIGLIGHTS

- The General Fund Operating Budget is balanced and shows a \$65k surplus.
- Establishes a Recession Reserve for the General Fund, Water and Wastewater Enterprise Funds.
- Implementation of a new cost allocation plan based on tracking of staff time and allocation costs using appropriate cost drivers.
- \$2.9 million CDBG project for Parents & Friends Inc. The proposed facility will be comprised of three, four-bedroom, three-bath residential units that will be constructed to be fully accessible and equipped for aging, disabled clients.
- Total Grants received; \$9m.
- Funding for 10 capital projects totaling \$13M

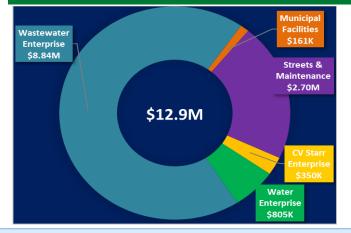

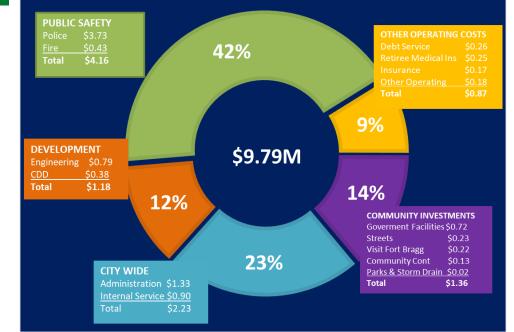
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM BUDGET



The City has a 5-Year CIP that identifies future capital projects over the next 5 years and helps City staff and Council prepare to secure funding for those projects. Some of the highlights are: Total number of projects: 10

- \$7.4M to complete the WW Treatment Upgrade.
- \$1.4M to rebuild 3 failing sanitary sewer lift stations.
- \$2.7M for street rehab, bike and pedestrian safety improvements

CITY WIDE BUDGET \$34.3M

GENERAL FUND; \$9.8 MILLION

The City's primary operating account - supports most City staff and key City services such as Police, Public Works, and CDD

WATER ENTERPRISE FUND; \$2.6 MILLION

Activities of the City's water treatment and distribution operations as well as expansion & maintenance of water system infrastructure.

WASTEWATER ENTERPRISE FUND; \$11.04 MILLION

Accounts for activities of the Fort Bragg Municipal Improvement District No.1 which provides the City's wastewater collection, treatment and Disposal operations as well as expansion, replacement and maintenance of the wastewater system infrastructure.

CV STARR ENTERPRISE FUND: \$2.17 MILLION

Accounts for all operations of the C.V Starr Center, including the local Sales tax restricted to funding operations of the center and the Property taxes collected by the city.

INTERNAL SERVICE FUNDS \$901k

Supports City vehicle replacements, maintenance and technology costs.

GENERAL FUND BUDGET CHALLENGES

✤ UNFUNDED LIABILITIES

The General Fund is the biggest budgetary challenge facing the city. Like most agencies in California, the city faces looming pressure related to the CALPERS unfunded liabilities & increasing pension costs. The City's pension costs are expected to double by fiscal year 2025 at close to \$2M per year.

- \$9.89M Net Pension Liability
- \$3.40M in unfunded OPEB liability (retiree healthcare)

✤ REVENUES

6,000,000

The General Fund is predominately supported by taxes (sales tax, Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT), property tax, and franchise taxes). With the city transitioning to a tourist economy it is not surprising that TOT has become the largest general fund revenue source. In recent years, the city has embarked on a Marketing & Promotion campaign aimed at further increasing TOT collections.
