BACKGROUND

The State of California Code of Government Regulations Title 7 Division 1 Chapter 3 Article 7 Administration of the General Plan Section 65103(c) states:

Annually review the capital improvement program of the city or county and the local public works project of other local agencies for their consistency with the general plan, pursuant to Article 7(commencing with Section 65400).

AGENDA ITEM NO.

Article 7 Section 65401 Review of public works projects for conformity with plan states:

The official agency receiving the list of proposed public works [recommended for planning, initiation, or construction during the ensuing fiscal year] shall list and classify all such recommendations and shall prepare a coordinated program of proposed public works for the ensuing fiscal year]. Such coordinated program shall be submitted to the county or city planning agency for review and report to said official agency as to conformity with the adopted general plan or part thereof.

In accordance with this State of California requirement, the Community Development Department conducted an analysis of the Capital Improvement Program for review and approval by Planning Commission.

The City of Fort Bragg Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the 2021 - 2022 Fiscal Year will be presented to City Council for adoption as part of the City's annual budget process. In accordance with State law, the City has designated the Planning Commission to conduct the required review for conformity with the City's General Plan.

GENERAL PLAN CONSISTENCY ANALYSIS

The City has two general plans, the Inland General Plan (IGP) adopted in 2012 and the Coastal General Plan (CGP) adopted in 2008. Projects that are location specific were reviewed for conformity with the appropriate General Plan. Citywide projects and projects with multiple or unspecified locations were reviewed for conformity with both the Inland and Coastal General Plans.

The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is divided into seven sections; Municipal Facilities, Parks & Community Services, CV Starr Enterprise, Street Maintenance & Traffic Safety, Water Enterprise, Wastewater Enterprise, and Storm Water. All projects listed in the CIP meet at least one goal, policy, or program in the General Plan(s) and staff did not find any projects that conflict with the City's Inland or Coastal General Plans.

Municipal Facilities

In the 2021-2022 CIP, there are 5 municipal facility projects that will undergo planning in the next fiscal year. These are covered under the Public Facilities Elements of both the IGP and CGP under Public Facilities Policy PF -2.7 which is to ensure that public buildings in the City are adequate to provide services for the community.

Parks & Community Services

There is one parks and community services project for Bainbridge Park in the CIP which falls under the purview of the Open Space element. This project is pending funding and conforms with Policy OS-9.4 to add or upgrade playground facilities and OS-9.4.1 to provide playground facilities and basketball courts at appropriate locations within neighborhoods. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

CV Starr Enterprise

The CIP also identifies six projects for the CV Starr Center that are scheduled for planning in the 2021-2022 fiscal year. These projects are all consistent with IGP Public Facilities Policy PF 2.7 to ensure public buildings are adequate to provide services for the community. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

Street Maintenance & Traffic Safety

The Street Maintenance and Traffic Safety section of the CIP includes three projects that will undergo planning, construction, or initiation. In addition to IGP Circulation Policy C-3.1 and CGP Circulation Policy C-2.1 which cover roadway improvements, there are two policies in the General Plan that require all circulation projects to conform. These are:

IGP Circulation Policy C-3.8: Conduit shall be installed in all new roads and road reconstruction projects and dedicated to the City of Fort Bragg. Conduit shall be sized to accommodate fiber optic and other telecom technologies.

IGP Circulation Policy C-11.2 and CGP Circulation Policy C-9.3: Where feasible, incorporate pedestrian and bicycle facilities into the design and construction of all road improvements.

Public Works staff have indicated that when possible, both conduit and pedestrian and bike improvements are included in all projects.

Additionally, the planning for pedestrian improvements at South Main Street and Cypress St. conform to CGP Circulation Program C-4.1.1, CGP Circulation Policy C-9.7, Circulation Goal C-9, and Circulation Goal C-10 which address pedestrian safety and improvements. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

Water Enterprise

The 2021-2022 CIP identifies ten Water Enterprise Projects for planning, or construction, or initiation. All of these projects conform to Goals, Policies, and/or Programs in the IGP and the CGP Public Faculties Elements. The majority are covered under Policy PF-2.4 to maintain the safety of the water supply and Program PF-2.4.1 to continue to maintain the water collection, treatment, and distribution system to ensure compliance with all state requirements for a public drinking water system. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

Wastewater Enterprise

There are three Wastewater Enterprise projects that are scheduled for either planning, construction, or initiation in the 2021-2022 CIP. Most projects fall under IGP and CGP Public Facilities Element Program PF-2.5.2 to continue to improve the wastewater treatment and disposal facility to comply with changing State requirements. Additionally, wastewater projects conform to policies to upgrade wastewater collector lines, and recycling of solid waste. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

Storm Water

There is only one Storm Water project which conforms to IGP Open Space Policy OS-6.5 to promote both the protection and restoration of water quality, and CGP OS-13 which addresses improving water quality through municipal activities. See Attachment 1 for the complete analysis.

In addition to reviewing for conformance with existing goals, policies, and programs, staff reviewed and confirmed that none of the listed projects in the CIP conflict with either General Plan.

RECOMMENDED PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION

Adopt resolution confirming that the 2021-2022 Capital Improvement Program projects scheduled for planning, construction, or initiation are in conformance with the City of Fort Bragg Coastal General Plan and the City of Fort Bragg Inland General Plan.

PROJECT HISTORY

Lack of pedestrian facilities on the west side of the City's South Main Street; State Route 1 (SR1) is not a new topic. City Staff prepared the South Main Street Access and Beautification Plan in 2011. This plan included a range of recommended options for improvements to SR1 from Oak Street south to the intersection of State Route 20 (SR20). The Beautification Plan featured several options for pedestrian and bicycle facilities ranging from a "baseline" build to a full "multi-use trail" separated from the five lane highway with planter strips. In 2013, previous Public Works Department staff began the search for funding options to implement these needed facilities with costs at the time requesting over \$5 million dollars. The project did not compete successfully in in its entirety, so over several iterations of the project application, staff finally secured \$1.5 million in State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) funds to complete the section of the project deemed as the highest need. The section, which scored as highest need for pedestrian access, is the facilities that connect pedestrians from the east side of the highway to the City's South Coastal Trail entrance at Cypress Street.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The upgrades associated with the STIP project include improvements to a section of State Route 1 (SR1) to bring it into conformance with current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards with much needed pedestrian facilities. The improvements in their current form are shown on the Project Plans (**Attachment 1**). The scope of work would be as follows:

- 1. Installation of approximately 1100 linear feet of new sidewalk. The proposed sidewalk improvements (construction) would be in the following location:
 - West side of SR 1 extending north from the intersection of SR 1 and Noyo Point Road to the intersection of SR 1 and Cypress Street on the west side of highway (southbound).
 - The sidewalk will create a connection from the east side of the highway down to the southernmost pedestrian entrance to the Coastal Trail.
- 2. Construction of a total of six curb ramps at streets and driveways.
- 3. Removing and replacing a 5' wooden fence on the west side of SR-1.
- 4. Relocation of underground utilities (including drainage features) and adjustment of utilities to grade; and pavement markings at specified locations.

The subject section of the SR 1 traverses through General Commercial (CG), Highway Visitor Commercial (CH) and Timber Resources Industrial (IT) zoning designations in the Coastal Zone. While the City's Zoning Map identifies SR 1 with these zoning designations, the SR 1 is a circulation corridor and the site development standards applicable to the aforementioned zoning designations would not apply within the SR 1 right of way. This STIP project will require a Coastal Development Permit.

BUDGET

The amount of funding allocated for this project is shown below. Caltrans and the California Transportation Commission (CTC) have a strict regime for programming, allocating, and expending funds so keeping this project on schedule is integral to a successful project.

DISCUSSION & ALTERNATIVES

The goal of this study session is for the Commission to provide early input to staff on the proposed development. Since this is a preliminary review of the proposal, the Commission should focus on the design aspects of the project and provide their own recommendations. Staff have also prepared multiple alternatives to help guide discussion.

When the application comes back to Planning Commission for formal review and consideration, it will include all requirements as it relates to a Coastal Development Permit and General Plan analysis.

The following potential alternatives for the South Main Street Corridor are listed below.

High Visibility Crosswalks This corridor of SR1 has a higher speed limit than other places in the City with an average daily trip count of over 10,000 vehicles. The southern corridor also provides multiple entrances to Noyo Headlands Park. As a highly traveled road, pedestrian safety has been identified as a concern by staff.

Crosswalk markings provide guidance for pedestrians crossing roadways by defining the appropriate path for them. Basic crosswalk markings consist of two parallel lines but high-visibility crosswalks typically make use of "ladder" style pavement markings, which are highly visible to approaching traffic. Figure 1 provides an example of a high visibility crosswalk. Things to consider when installing high visibility crosswalks:

- Additional features in conjunction with the crosswalks such as crosswalk signage or additional lighting.
- May give pedestrians a false sense of security.
- Avoid using contrasting materials to asphalt such as brick. These materials cost much more to maintain, and lose contrast over time and in nighttime/rainy conditions.



1. Aesthetic Improvements

Based on prior decisions from Planning Commission on projects of similar scope, the aesthetics of these improvements are a high priority. Staff have identified two potential options for aesthetic improvement.

Mosaic or Stamped Concrete Landing: located at the southwest corner of
the intersection of Highway 1 and Cypress Street. The existing area is a
heavily disturbed gravel path and has been paved over multiple times in the
past. Staff have identified this area as a potential location to improve
aesthetics. This improvement could come in the form of a mosaic path
which would connect to the coastal trail.







 Mural Fencing: As part of this improvement plan, the fence along the west side of Highway 1 will need to be replaced. As part of this replacement, Staff believes commissioning a mural along the fence is a simple way to aesthetically improve the area. See figure 2 as an example.



2. Bicycle Lane Improvements

The current bike lane along Highway 1 is a Class II facility, or an on-road bicycle lane. As stated previously, this section of Highway 1 has a high speed and is highly traveled road. Maintaining bicyclist safety could be achieved with simple tactics.

- Protected Bike Lanes: Separated lanes can take various forms but they all
 consist of some form of physical separation. Plastic bollards are
 inexpensive and can be easily removed. This will also give bicyclists more
 protection wile clearly signaling to drivers the potential presence of bike
 traffic.
- Green Spot Treatment: Similar to the plastic bollards, paint can be used to create separation and increase the overall visibility of the bike lanes. Many cities use green paint in specific locations to either separate or demarcate bike lanes.
- Street Signage: Due to the speed limit along highway 1, it is important that bikers ride with the flow of traffic rather than against. Bicyclists put themselves and others in danger when riding against traffic. Similar to a "wrong way" sign for motorists, bike related direction signage could be installed.

When considering bike line improvements, it is also important to remember the limited scope of the overall project. Most improvements are done in conjunction with larger projects due to the distance bicyclists cover. So it's important to scale any selected

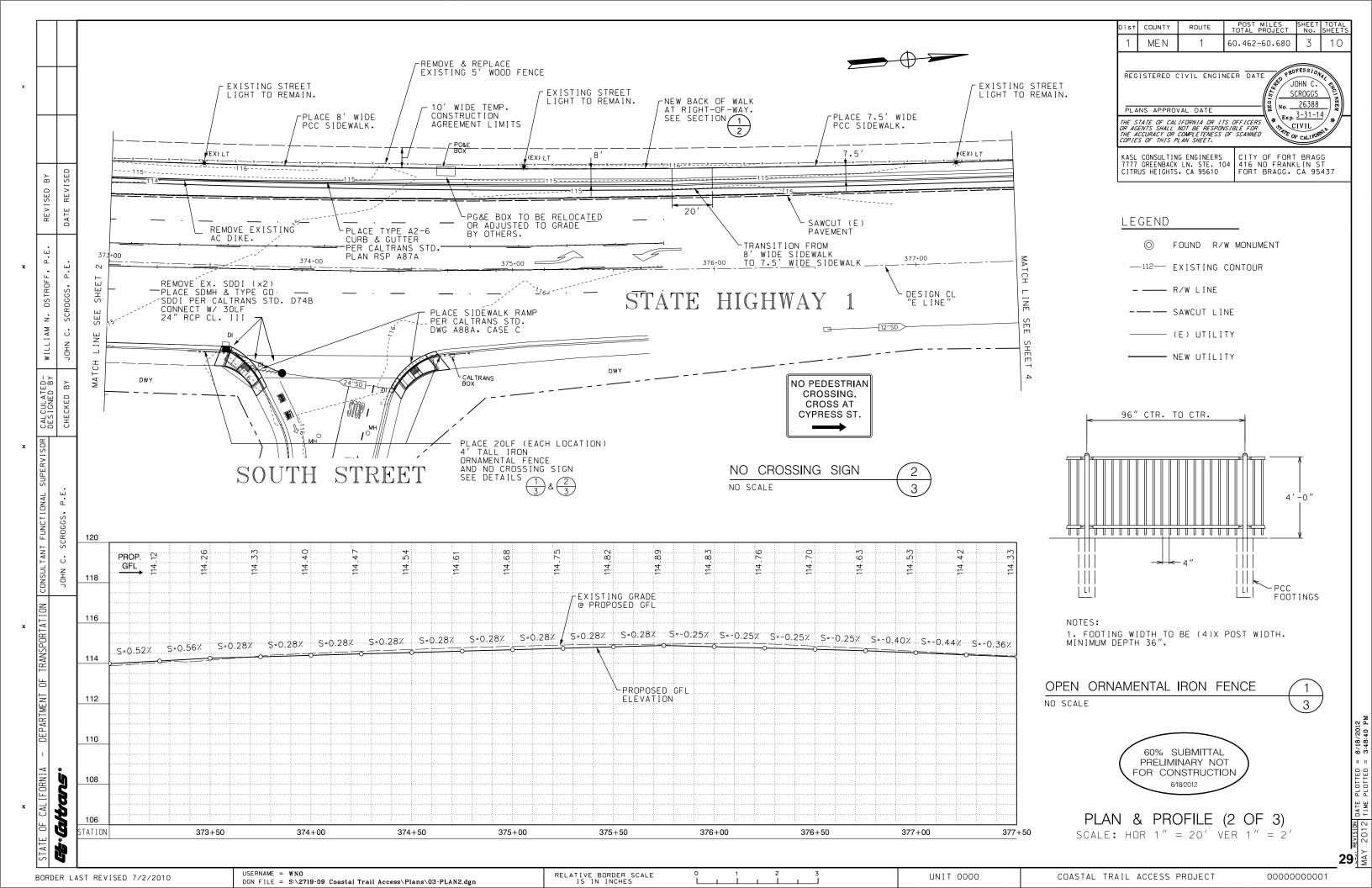
improvements to this site specifically as improvements will not extend beyond the project limits.

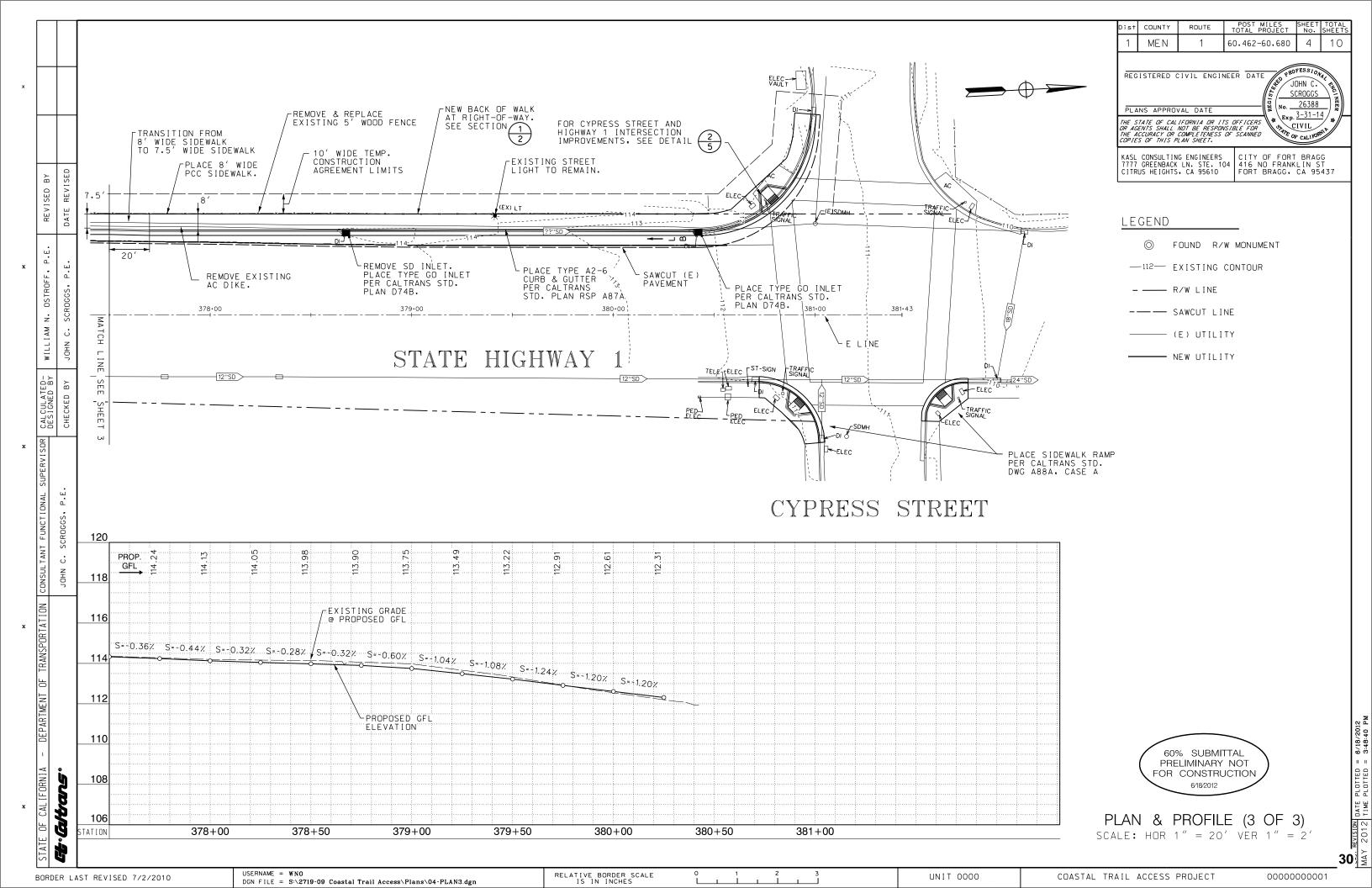

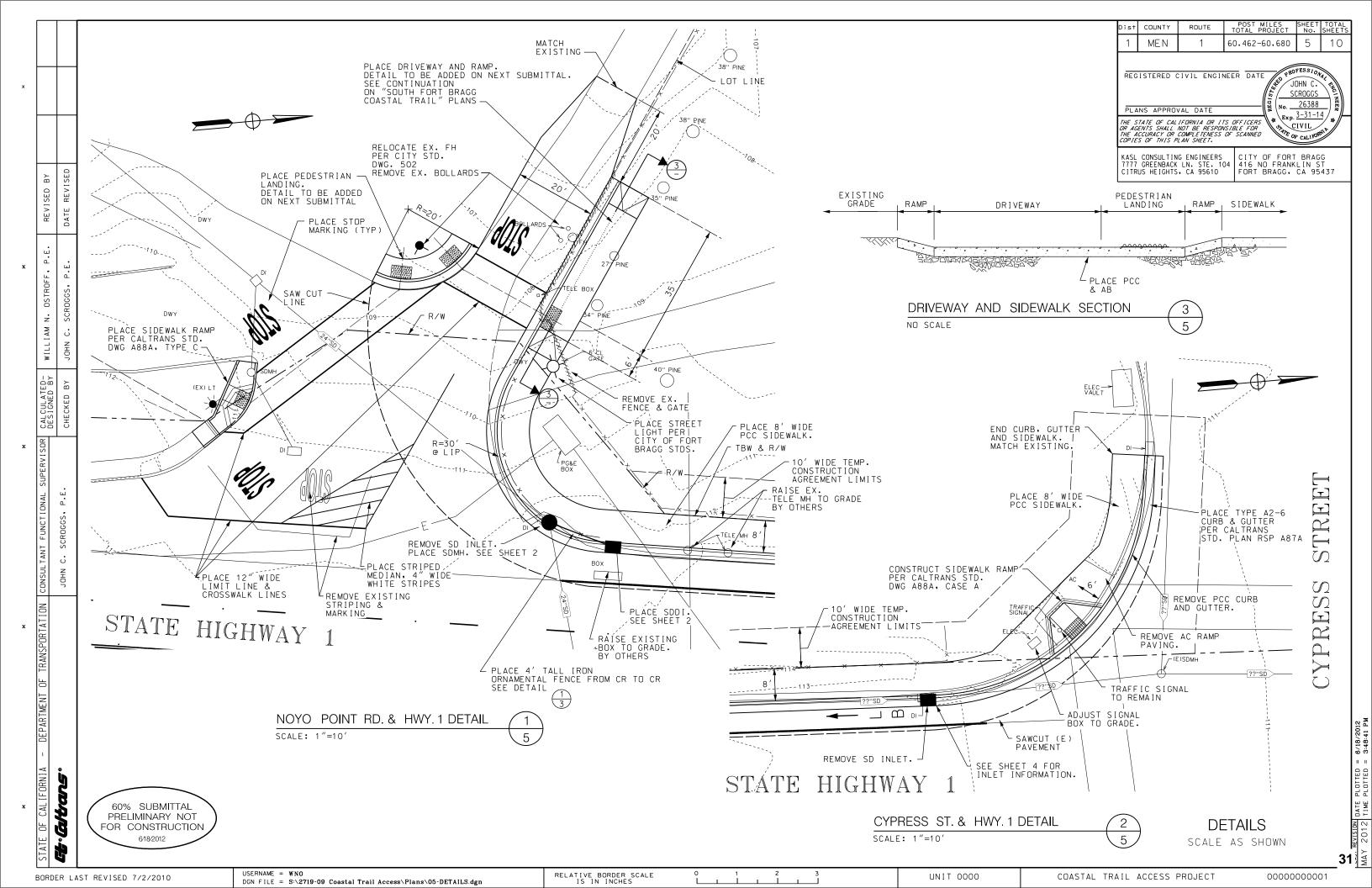

Dear Planning Commissioners,

I appreciate having the opportunity to comment on a future plan. I have read the 12011 South Main Street Access and Beautification Plan when it first was published.

As we are still in the Environmental and Design Phase I want to submit my thoughts below. Looking at page 4 of the Staff Presentation the amount of money needed for this project will be about \$3 million. I understand that you secured \$1.5 million in STIP money.

The staff report lists under project description the scope of work including #'s 1 to 4. # 3 To have a mural on the new fence should only happen if there was a juried show with artwork presented by local artists. As this is the fence bordering the old GP property and in the past the public was not allowed to enter (when it was still the GP mill) it might be interesting to reflect that logging history.

4 relocations of underground utilities. I kept asking in my public comments to Caltrans if small cell wireless devices will be installed or prepared for future installation. I never got an answer, but insist that the public is informed about that. Caltrans listed the installations of joint poles. Will any of these be considered as well? Who would have access to these?

On page 7 of 9 Alternative # 2 Aesthetic Improvements you show a picture of a star shaped icon which I could see possible, but I would prefer that the area in front of the fence is landscaped by drought tolerant plants, cactus, etc. Nothing else would need to be done.

As far as crosswalk markings are concerned I do not necessarily believe the 10,000 daily trip count. Traffic studies for the Hare Creek mall, the Grocery Outlet Bargain Market, as well as the Auto Zone were faulty. Instead of having a 40 miles per hour speed limit in certain areas it would be better to slow the traffic down to 35 miles per hour and 25 miles per hour for areas closer to downtown. That way we do not have to make Fort Bragg look like any big city. After all we still have a chance to declare SR 1 as a scenic road. The tourists (that are our bread and butter) who come here do not want more Wrong Way/Ride With Traffic signs, green painted bike lanes, crosswalk signage, additional lighting, "ladder" pavement markings, etc.

This area attracted many artists who have a keen sense for what is aesthetically pleasing and realize what is calming and pleasing to the human senses. Just because Caltrans gets away with their corporate designs in certain cities does not mean this is the only option for Fort Bragg.

To do any work in downtown Fort Bragg it is extremely important that this does not become a piecemeal job. It needs to be looked as holistically as 1 project, no matter who finances what (Caltrans, STIP, MCOG, the City, or other entities). Also this work needs to be done not in the middle of the summer in the middle of tourist season. Also it is important to be calculating in that possible construction of a Grocery Outlet, a second Dollar Store, the Avalon Hotel and Conference Center, etc. needs to be taken care off so that the public and the tourists have a break from constant construction for safety reasons, noise issues, and piece of mind.
